What is behind a name?

Most names have a particular meaning. There are lots of names that come from Latin or ancient Greek and that have a specific origin. Here are some examples of names and their meanings.

EUPHEMIA f.

Usage: Ancient Greek, English
Pronounced: yoo-FEM-ee-a (English)
Means “to speak well”, derived from Greek eu “good” and phenai “to speak”. Saint Euphemia was an early martyr who was burnt at the stake.

DIANA f.

Usage: English, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Romanian, Russian, Lithuanian

Roman mythology

Pronounced: die-AN-a (English)
Probably derived from an old Indo-European root meaning “heavenly, divine”, related to dyeus (see ZEUS). Diana was a Roman goddess of the moon, hunting, forests, and childbirth, often identified with the Greek goddess Artemis. Diana Spencer, the Princess of Wales, was a famous bearer of this name.

EVARISTUS m.

Usage: Ancient Greek (Latinized)
Means “to please well”, derived from Greek eu “good, well” and areskein “to please”. This was the name of the fifth pope, supposedly martyred under emperor Hadrian.
